





The Inside Scoop

with Kevin Donaghey (subbing in for Cory Culmer) interview with: Carol Mahoney, Owner U-Pick Blueberries



Hi Carol. I am Kevin for the article of interviewing businesses at The Saint Joseph's Chronicle. I am filing in for Cory Culmer. My name is Kevin Donaghey and I would like to ask you a dozen questions this morning. I have been out to visit the blueberry rows and it was nice. I am really enjoying being involved in this!



Can you tell me how long U-Pick Blueberries has been operating in the Santa Maria Valley?

We have been here doing the "U-Pick" for about eight to ten years. We bought this property in 2004 and actually only planted blueberries in a very small plot. We planted broccoli and some other interesting things, but then the blueberries caught on! They were so popular and are so good for you that we just expanded and focused on the blueberries. No more broccoli! Now it's all about blueberries....





What made your family decide to focus on blueberries and not another type of fruit?

Well my husband is a fourth generation farmer in this valley and he has always grown broccoli, lettuce, cauliflower...all those row type of crops. As we got older, he started looking toward the future and retirement. He knew that he didn't want to grow row crops for ever, so we bought this property. Then he investigated!

We didn't buy this property with the intent of doing blueberries, but then he read and studied about the benefit of blueberries to your body, health, and well being. The benefits were hard to overlook! My husband researched where to get the best plants and we bought our first batch. Planting blueberries is not like conventional farming where you plant a seed and you bring that to fruition and then you harvest it. Blueberries are called high bush berries and they don't have thorns. They are just a fun plant to work with! It just felt like a good thing to do. So, we started with just a small plot and we grew.





What makes U-Pick Blueberries so special? It sounds like LOVE. With the fulfillment there, or "Fruit-fillment"!

Yes that is right, "Fruit-fillment"! We have had customers say that it is healing and meditative to come out to the fields and pick blueberries. There is something about being out in the plants, snacking on blueberries, and listening to the birds. It is quiet and peaceful in a beautiful surrounding.





The U-Pick was born because we had so much left over. We pick for Driscoll Farms. We use to hire expensive labor to pick blueberries and then the market for blueberries would run out. It is all about supply and demand. We weren't able to make enough money to pay the pickers, so we would cut off our sales to Driscoll. After we quit selling to Driscoll, we would look out on the bushes and see all the amazing fruit that was left. So, our daughter who has five children said, "You know what Dad, my friends would come out here and pick these blueberries and they would probably pay you for the buckets that they haul out of here."....And that is how U-Pick Blueberries was born!

Are blueberries native to North America both on the Eastern Seaboard and the West Coast?

I don't know that they are native here. When you think of blueberries, you think of Maine, Michigan, and the East Coast. I get a lot of people out here with fond childhood memories of going out in those areas and picking wild blueberries. They come out and are very discerning about the flavor! They have their favorites. I have a lady that will taste a specific blueberry and it takes her right back to her childhood. There is a variation of flavors because we have several varieties. What we understood when we bought our first plants is that they were bred for this area, meaning they are more tolerant of the climate that we have here. We buy our plants from a big nursery called Fall Creek in Oregon. Blueberries are also native to that area. I think that our area supports them well, even though they are not necessarily native.





Why should people get blueberries from U Pick Blueberries instead of the grocery store?

Because they are so fresh! There is a big difference. In fact, I have had several people say, "I don't really care for blueberries." That is actually how I felt! They were just kind of bland to me. I never really liked blueberries back in the day. When we started growing them, I started eating them because they were so healthy. I couldn't believe how flavorful they were. I think people change their mind about our blueberries because they are so fresh. They also last a long time. Before blueberries in our area become ripe, they are brought in from South America and from Mexico. We typically buy blueberries at the store that have been stored for a long time, so they taste kind of flat. If you come out here and pick blueberries, you are getting them right off the bush and they are fresh.





Do you grow anything besides blueberries?

Well actually now we are growing "Albion" strawberries! We also started growing a variety of blackberries called "Freedom" and they are thornless. Recently we planted lavender and would love to be able to offer people the chance to pick their own fresh lavender bouquet.



We decided last year to give apricots a shot. Our strawberries and blackberries are very sweet, there is a lot of sugar in those. Sugar tends to not transport well for growers, so it starts breaking down quickly. We carry varieties of strawberries and blackberries that are not typically found in the grocery store because they don't ship well with the sugar content. The harvest time for blackberries is typically in June. The major harvest time for blueberries is the first week in July. Strawberries produce all throughout the season. The weather has been crazy this last year. It was warm in November and December and the plants thought it was time to bear their fruit. It is going to be an interesting year, since the majority of our bushes are still coming!







Is U-Pick Blueberries a seasonal Farm, meaning are there certain times of the year that you are closed?

Yes! Once the blueberries are finished up, we close. We usually close later in the summer. We have gone as late as the end of July. But, this year could be completely different because of the weather. It is better for the plants if we end right after the Fourth of July, because then we start pruning them all back. The pruning process is important for the plants. The trunk of the bush that is coming up gets thicker and thicker over time. After the plant is about six years old, you go in with big loppers and cut out the oldest wood at the very bottom of the bush. Once the old thick wood has been removed, the bush will push out new growth. The bush will keep regenerating if properly pruned. It is a lot of work! Once we do our yearly pruning it will look like nothing is left, but in about a month the bushes will be full with new green growth.







Can you explain to me a little bit about how you know when a blueberry is ready to pick?

Blueberries need to be a really, really dark purple color. You can tell as you are pulling blueberries off the stem. If the blueberries are a little hard to pull, then the sugar is not quite there and the blueberries might be a little too tart. If the blueberry just falls right off the stem, then there is a lot of sugar and the blueberry will be very sweet. Everybody has their own personal preference. They just need to be dark. You can also take blueberries that are not quite ripe and put them in your windowsill and they will continue to ripen.





Do you instruct people on how to pick blueberries when they arrive at the Farm?

No, I say go out there and have fun!!! Once you start picking blueberries and eating them, you figure it out. I like to pick my blueberries individually and throw them in my bucket.

During certain parts of the summer there will be big clusters of blueberries. Sometimes you can just put your bucket under the cluster and they fall right off!





Is there a prize winning blueberry?

We have seen huge ones! We actually have a group that comes out here every summer and has a contest on who can pick the biggest blueberry. We have had our "Emerald" variety produce blueberries that were larger then a quarter! You can find blueberry varieties based on the color of the post at the end of the blueberry rows. The yellow posts are the "Snow Chaser" variety and the white posts are the "Spring High" variety. We have so many of the "Emerald" variety that those posts are not painted.





What are the hours of operation for U-Pick Blueberries?

We are open from 9:00am to 4:00pm, Wednesday through Sunday. We are always closed on Mondays and Tuesdays.

I really liked the chicken and the blueberry BBQ sauce.





Chicken with Blueberry BBQ Sauce, Fruit and Green Salad

Ingredients:

- 2 Cups Fresh Blueberries
- 3/4 Cup Ketchup
- 1/2 Cup Apple Cider Vinegar
- 1/2 Cup Splenda Brown Sugar
- 1 Tbs. Light Molasses
- 1 Tsp. Chili Powder
- 1 Tsp. Ground Black Pepper

Fruit Salad

- 2 Cups strawberries, sliced
- 3 Kiwi, peeled and sliced
- 3 Bananas, sliced
- 2 Cuties, peeled and sliced
- 1 Cup seedless grapes
- 2 Cups blueberries

Green Salad

- Red Leaf Lettuce, chopped
- Green Leaf Lettuce, chopped
- Romaine Lettuce, chopped
- Red Onion, sliced
- Cucumber, sliced
- Red Bell Pepper, sliced
- Tomato, sliced

Directions:

Combine blueberries, ketchup, vinegar, Splenda, molasses, chili powder, and black pepper in a medium saucepan. Stir in 1/2 cup water. Bring the mixture to a boil over high heat, stirring constantly. Reduce heat to low and simmer, stirring occasionally until sauce is slightly thickened and chunky. Pour sauce over BBQ chicken and serve.


