




"We have a sun door on our coop. The sun makes it open or we can open it with a tool."













Garden Salad & Hamburger Patty with Fried Egg

Garden Salad

Serves 6

Ingredients:

- 8 cups romaine or green leaf lettuce torn into bite-sized pieces
- 1 pint cherry tomatoes
- 3 to 4 radish ends trimmed, sliced
- 1 bag of shredded carrots
- 1 bunch of cilantro, chopped
- 2 cucumbers halved lengthwise and chopped
- 1 bunch of green onion, chopped
- 2 colored bell peppers, chopped
- 3 avocados sliced

Directions:

In a large bowl, combine all ingredients.

Top with the salad dressing of your choice.

Hamburger Patty with Fried Egg Serves 6

Ingredients:

6 hamburger patties favorite seasoning 6 eggs 1 stick butter

Directions:

Using tongs, place the hamburgers over the hottest part of the fire or directly over the heat and grill, turning once, for 5 to 7 minutes per side for medium-rare, or until done.

In a cast iron skillet over medium-high heat, melt the butter. When the butter foams, break the eggs into the pan, spacing them about 2 inches apart. Reduce the heat to low and season the eggs. Cook until the whites are set and the yolks are just beginning to firm around the edge, about 5 minutes.














The Inside Scoop with Kevin Donaghy

Interview with Wanda Snow Porter Author of "Emily Decides"



Are there any special writing styles of specialization that you combine in a book?

Well, not really. I try to write at a fourth-grade level. My main goal is to keep the word usage and sentence structure such that it won't be too hard. I also like to try and make it fun! Plus, the illustrations, of course, help to tell the story. Doing the illustrations is the most fun for me!





Is the story of Blanco, Sara, and Emily in your book, *Emily Decides*, based upon historical fact?

Yes. All three of the burro picture books are based upon something that truly happened to the Adobe burros. The woman who was the director of the Adobe at the time loved the burros and always had fun stories to tell about the things that happened. This particular story from *Emily Decides*, the donkeys did make an escape. They had been in a corral, up by the house in those days, and somehow they managed to open the gate and they took off! They ended up on the other side of Thompson Street. I added to my story of course. They never quite made it to town before somebody called and reported them out and they were brought home. I thought it would be fun for the readers of *Emily Decides* to walk the town of Nipomo. So we made the burros walk the town and of course, there is no place like home, so they ended up back home where they should be.





Do you have fun writing about animal characters in your stories?

Oh yes! When I first started writing about Emily, Blanco, and Sara I would come to visit them at the Adobe. I was doing their illustrations, so I wanted to do my best to make sure that each one looked different when I drew them. Each donkey had their own personality. Blanco was very reserved, he was more wild and didn't want to get petted. Sara thought she was a superstar! She was like a spoiled little girl. Emily was the mothering one. She was sweet and kind, very motherly to both burros, where Sara was very spunky. So it was very fun drawing those pictures and getting to know the burros. I fell in love with them!





The Dana Adobe in Nipomo is the location of the flavorful tale *Emily Decides*. Do you live and work in Nipomo?

I have lived in Nipomo for 40 years now. My husband was Captain Dana's great-great grandson. So, we were already attached to the Adobe when I started working here as a docent and writing the books for the DANA Cultural Center.





Have you ever had any of your books read over the radio or made into an audio book?

No, I have not done any audio books. I have read my books in public but not on the radio.





A beautifully depicted illustrated chair of *Emily Decides* was enrolled in this year's Friends of the Santa Maria Public Library 8th Annual Painted Chair Raffle by The Santa Maria Explorers Club. Were you surprised that your book was chosen?

Yes, I was surprised! Delighted might be a better word. I was very pleased, and it was a beautiful chair. You guys did such a good job building it and painting it. I was so impressed, I couldn't believe it. It was beautiful! I bought tickets, but I didn't win. Then I was thinking after I bought the tickets, that is one heavy, stout bench. How am I ever going to pick it up to get it home? But, I thought I will call everybody I know to get this thing home if I win. Unfortunately, I didn't win, but I am hoping that next year you enter the raffle again.





Because of authoring a book, do you have "known journalist" or "local contributing writer" fame?

I don't think I have much fame. But, I have attended Allan Hancock College, where I have made some appearances. I still take art classes, it is continuing my education. It has opened a different world for me for sure. I think people know me because I have written some books, so they will come up and talk to me. So, I have gotten to know people that I never would have gotten to know otherwise. I guess that could be considered a type of fame. It has been a really wonderful adventure to write these books.





Where can your books be purchased?

Well, they sometimes have my used books available on Amazon. Most of the Adobe books are available for sale at the DANA Cultural Center. They are a limited publication, so the first Sara book sold out right away. They were made into hard cover to go into library circulation in Nipomo and Arroyo Grande.





Have you ever been a contributing writer for another author?

My writing career started by doing a newsletter for a horse riding group. This was a long time ago! Horseback riding lessons was my career and I had students with a donkey and I drew some pictures of the donkey and used him to help teach my students through a story. The director saw my work and wanted me to write a little story to teach children how to be safe around horses. That story was published for a riding group in a book with a lot of other works by other famous people. That was really a thrill! The picture books started after that. I did some books for an older audience and now I am back to the younger picture books. I have written five novels and five picture books total. I am currently working on a 6th picture book!









Do you have a degree from attending school?

I have an AA degree in Liberal Arts from Allan Hancock College.





Are you, Wanda Snow Porter, yourself, an avid reader of California history?

Oh yes! I love California history. It is so fascinating. Of course, my husband is Captain Dana's great-great grandson and through his association with the Adobe, it gives me a wonderful association to local history. It makes history more interesting and it becomes more alive when you see the house, the land, the people. I was born in California and I love the state. Now I am particularly interested in the Santa Fe Trail. My husband's other great-great grandfather came from Saint Louis with Jedediah Smith, the first people that came over the mountains from back East. It is just so interesting.





How many years in professional writing have you now worked?

It has been over 25 years now that I have been doing this as a career. Being serious about it, making myself sit down almost every day and doing a little bit and the research. I love doing research! Sometimes it is hard to make yourself stop researching.
