Hello Frank, I understand that you are the new owner here at Central Coast and Valley Shoe and Boot Repair. How long have you been operating in the Williams Brothers Shopping Center, here at 709 E. Main St.?

I have been here for about a year and five months now. I was formerly working for Carr's Boot Shop.





How did you learn to repair shoes?

My father taught me the trade. Not only was my father a shoe repairman but so were my mother and sister.





How long has cobbling been a talent for you?

I have been doing it for 35 to 40 years.





Did you ever learn the trade of *cordwainer*? Have you ever made a pair of shoes from scratch?

No, I have never, and I don't think I will ever try! My father didn't either. We both only strictly knew shoe repair.





What are your days and hours of operation, here at Central Coast Valley Shoe and Boot Repair?

Monday, I am open 12 pm to 6 pm. Tuesday through Thursday, I am open 9 am to 5:30 pm. Fridays, I am open 9 am to 6 pm. Saturdays, I am open 9 am to 1 pm. Sundays, I am closed. My daughter comes in once in awhile to help out with customers and some of the elastic sewing, but I am the only shoe repairman here. That is why my hours are a little different.





What types of items are you able to repair at your shop?

I do purse handles, zipper sliders, work boot soles, work boot heels, cowboy boot soles, cowboy boot heels, and we also do a lot of rebuilding the bottom of fireman boots.











Do you offer any other services other than repairs at your shop. For example, can you change a shoe's color?

We do dying. I don't do as much anymore because I don't have a big fan for ventilation when spraying and airbrushing. I just offer strictly brown and black now because I can just use a dye.






At this shop, are you accustomed to service needs required for orthopedic footwear?

Yes, we do orthopedic build-ups. We can do 1/8 of an inch up to 4 inches for a shoe build-up.

Is it more affordable to repair shoes than to buy a new pair?

The way they make shoes now, you can buy a cheap pair of shoes to match everything. But, if you want something that is going to last you a long time and still look good, I would suggest buying a more expensive, better brand shoe that is repairable. There are lots of quality brands. I like working on Allen Edmond shoes. They are a really nice quality men's dress shoe that is repairable. Allen Edmond, Cole Haan, and Florsheim are all very repairable brands.






How long do repairs generally take?

It all depends on the work. Half soles or heels could take about an hour to get done. Fireman boots, I like to take the entire day to work on. It is important that the job is done right. The sole of the boot has to be able to withstand heat and have really good traction. Timing just really depends on the specific job.






Shoe Stitcher. The most important machine in the shop, stitches sole edging all the way around the shoe by inserting the shoe upside down.




Boot Horns. These stitch boots from the inside out.



Heel Wheel. This machine presses nails up into the boot heel. A wire heel nailer pushes wire into a rubber heel so you don't have to use nails.

What is the most popular shoe color that comes to your shop for repairs?

I would say black, light brown, and a few tans.






Frank, may I ask if boots are a more popular item to be repaired than a svelte shoe?

Living here at the coast, we do a lot of work boots and cowboy boots. When I first moved here, I was really surprised. I grew up in LA and worked in Santa Monica; we did a lot of dress shoes. A lot of prime dress shoes!

I left LA and moved to a little town called Exeter, CA, and it was all cowboy boots. That is when I learned to work on boots. John Carr got me a job here, in Santa Maria, at Carr's Boots and Western Wear. I worked on mostly work boots and cowboy boots. Now, I seem to be starting to get more dressier shoes, like women's heels. I would say 80% of my business is boots.

We typically charge customers \$75 to \$85 to resole. I tell customers that if they buy a pair of boots for \$100 and they really like them, and they are broke in, then they are worth getting repaired once. Typically, by the time you need that second repair, the tops aren't worth repairing in a cheaper pair of boots. But, I have guys that just keep bringing the same pair of boots back and I have repaired them three or four times. Danner boots are a really good work boot. Georgia and Ariat boots are also good boots that have really good wear to them.

What is the all time most unique repair which you have made?

I actually did a unique pair of boots a few months ago! To me, the boots looked like they had fish scales on them. The boots were so worn out that I could put my fist through the bottom of the sole of the shoe. That is how bad it was! I had to tear it all apart because it was a leather boot. The customer and I talked about putting on rubber soles, but I got so into the work of fixing it up that I ended up putting on a leather sole. Then I had to tear it all down because I put the wrong sole on! The customer was a young man that wore a size 14 and he loved his boots.

If there is any way to fix shoes, I will. There is some work that I take on sometimes and probably shouldn't because it takes more time trying to fix it than it is worth. There are times when I catch myself just taking too long doing patchwork. I love my job! I do, however, plan on semi-retiring from doing patchwork next year. But soles and heels I will continue to do. I will have to stick around to work on the big machines. If these machines break down, you really have to know how to put them back together. Few people know how to fix the big stitchers. I think the only other shoe repair shop like this in the area, is Paso Robles or Santa Barbara.

It is a dying trade, but a good trade, if you find a location where a shop has already been established. I get a lot of customers from Lompoc, San Luis Obispo, and obviously Santa Maria. I am hoping to get one of my boys in here. If I semi-retire, then I can start showing them the trade.
